Lincoln Community Forest

- 396 acres wild and scenic hardwood and conifer forest in the Town of Lincoln, Bayfield County
- Scenic and rugged terrain of high bluffs and deep valleys and 2 ½ miles of the Marengo River
- 10 acre lake and numerous forest wetlands
- Open to everyone for nature-based recreation (hunting, fishing, hiking, cross country skiing)
- Titled to Landmark Conservancy, managed in partnership under agreement with FLCF

The Friends of the Lincoln Community Forest (FLCF) is a non-profit organization that incorporated in March 2013

Mission: To facilitate the conservation and enjoyment of the Lincoln Community Forest

Vision: We envision the Lincoln Community Forest and Marengo River within as a community asset:

- That is rigorously managed throughout
 - to ensure a healthy, sustainable & scenic forest,
 - to protect its natural and historic character.
- That provides in the South Unit a small network of primitive trails where the visitor can enjoy nature-based recreation.
- That preserves the North Unit in a largely undeveloped state.





Wildlife Habitat and Forest Management

- Planted 100 Red Oak and 50 White Spuce
- Oak for climate change resilience
- Spruce for added diversity
- Will plant again this spring



Planting Pines for Climate Resilience

- Landmark Conservancy will plant 2 plots to white pine.
- Important to retard growth of aspen where white pine is planted
- Used Garlon, painted on aspen sprouts individually
- Planting this spring







